
Plymouth Christian Academy Summer Reading Program for Grade 7

Step One, Record your Initial Beliefs:

- *Journal Entry #1* Use one complete paragraph (5-8 sentences) to answer the following questions:
 - What is intelligence? How do you know if a person is "smart"?

Step Two, Read:

• Enjoy reading Fish in a Tree by Lynda Mullaly Hunt

Step Three, Record Key Text Information:

- *Journal Entry #2* Use one complete paragraph (5-8 sentences) to answer the following questions:
 - Is Ally intelligent? How do you know? Summarize important information from the novel to support your answer.

Step Four, Research:

- Carefully analyze the information found in **BOTH** of the following articles:

Step Five, Record Any New Understandings:

- *Journal Entry #3* Use one complete paragraph (5-8 sentences) to respond to the following prompts:
 - Identify the 8 types of intelligences and explain what they mean in your own words.
 - What type of intelligence(s) do you have? What makes you think that?

Step Six, Let's See your Intelligence:

- Choose **ONE** of the following project options below that you will share with your class when we return to school:
 - **Graphic Novel:** Design a graphic representation of the novel *Fish in a Tree*. Use images, speech/thought bubbles, dialogue, and/or narration to retell the story. Must be 15-20 panels in length.
 - TV Interview: Use your phone, tablet, computer, or any other video recording device to conduct an interview with a main character from the novel. Must be between 3-5 minutes long. Props, supporting actors, and special effects are welcome.
 - Alternate Ending: Not crazy about the way the author ended the book?
 Now is your chance to rewrite the ending to the novel. Craft a new final chapter to the novel. Must be 2-3 pages, typed, Times New Roman font, and double-spaced.

Tips:

- If you find reading challenging, try following along in the novel while listening to the audio book.
- Do not wait until last minute to complete this assignment. It's not worth the stress!
- Work with your family to create a "reading schedule" that helps you to know what chapters to read each week, so that you complete the novel on time.
